Stanley Wien has been a lifelong student of Theodore Roosevelt and an active member of the Theodore Roosevelt Association. Mr. Wien spans a diverse career in psychology, human resources and management consulting, which includes executive positions with such leading international companies as Deloitte, Gartner Group and Capgemini. He holds an M.S. and B.A. degree in Psychology.

He has lectured and consulted with leading global organizations on a wide range of subjects, namely conflict resolution, collective bargaining, communications and change management.
