



BENJAMIN WETZEL



Benjamin Wetzel is an Assistant Professor of History at Taylor University. He studies the intersection of American religious, political, and intellectual history in the period from 1860 to 1920. Prior to Taylor University, he was a Postdoctoral Research Associate at the Cushwa Center for the Study of American Catholicism at the University of Notre Dame, and a Postdoctoral Teaching Scholar in the History Department at the University of Notre Dame.

Wetzel is writing two books, one of which is titled

Theodore Roosevelt: Preaching from the Bully Pit, a religious biography of Theodore Roosevelt. He has written two peer-reviewed journal articles for the *Journal of the Gilded Age and Progressive Era* and the *Journal of Church and State*. He also spoke at the Center for Vision & Values at Grove City College last year, where he presented *Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, and the Protestant Mainline: Religious Perspectives of World War I*.

Wetzel is a member of the American Historical Association and the Theodore Roosevelt Association. He earned a BA in History from Grove City College, an MA in History from Baylor University, and Ph.D. in History from the University of Notre Dame.
